

Her formal training began at Michigan State University (BS, DVM), followed by a large animal rotating internship at the University of Minnesota, and the completion of her nutrition residency and PhD at Ohio State University.

Dr. Susan Kilborn received her DVM degree from the Western College of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Saskatchewan. After several years of emergency and critical care practice in Winnipeg, she completed a postgraduate degree in epidemiology and acid-base physiology through the DVSc program in Clinical Studies at the Ontario Veterinary College, University of Guelph. She became board-certified by the American College of Veterinary Internal Medicine in 1995. Dr. Kilborn currently sees referral internal medicine cases in Ottawa, consults for Antech Diagnostic Laboratories, and has been the Ottawa region and One Health director for Community Veterinary Outreach since 2005. She was the recipient of the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association Small Animal Practitioner Award in 2015.
